# What We Know

PERHAPS THE REASON one might enroll at the American University in Washington, D.C., would be to study politics. And if one were indeed enrolled in such a class at such a school it might safely be assumed that one would have reasonable knowledge—or at least curious, and on the path to said knowledge—of the politics being played out every day in that capital city of our nation.

And that assumption would be incorrect.

We will not here bemoan further the discouraging priorities of this contemporary, temporal society, for that is self-evident. So long as public teachers insist that “self-esteem” trumps hard facts, what more can we expect?

Yet believers cannot throw stones. How many in our midst know the detailed box scores of their favorite baseball team, but

can’t find the Sermon on the Mount in their Bible? How many know the names of every player on their favorite NFL team, but can’t find Israel on a map? How many of our youth know the lyrics of every song by the profligate pop star, Justin Bieber, but don’t know the words to “How Great Thou Art”?

We cannot say we love our Lord if we do



not obey Him, and we cannot obey Him if we do not know what He has said to us in His word. The apostle Paul put it well in his letter to the Colossians:

For this reason also, since the day we heard of it, we have not ceased to pray for you and to ask that you may be filled with the [true, full] knowledge of His will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding, so that you will walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, to please Him in all

respects, bearing fruit in every good work and increasing in the [true, full] knowledge of God.

Colossians 1:9-10 (definition added)

One cannot truly love and obey what one does not know. Indeed, it is by knowing Jesus *that* we love Him. When we learn not just that He “died for our sins,” but the

true depth and meaning of that sacrifice; His absolute devotion to each of His followers as advocate, friend and brother; His true personality—not defined by Hollywood and the ignorant, but by His word; His relationship to the Father and the Spirit—then and only then are we able to love Him and dedicate our lives to Him.

What it means is that we must be attending classes every day; we must be always in the school of learning about Him. As we attend this holy enterprise, our love for Him grows and deepens.
