4		(wearily)
5	Father?	
6		
7		Abraham
8		(distractedly)
9	Yes.	
10		
11		Isaac
12	My feet hurt.	
13		
14		Abraham
15		(absentmindedly)
16	Yes.	
17		
18		Isaac
19		(emphatically)
20	Father?	
21		
22		Abraham
23	Yes.	
24		
25		Isaac
26	My <u>back</u> hurts.	
27		
28		Abraham
29	Yes.	
30		
31		Isaac
32		(even more emphatically)
33	Father?

1	Abraham
2	(irritated)
3	Yes!
4	
5	Isaac
6	(desperately)
7	Your donkey is giving out!
8	
9	Abraham
10	(now paying attention)
11	Yes, yes—of course. The donkey's father is giving out as well. Let's rest a
12	while.
13	
14	Isaac immediately drops his load—which sends the wood flying in
15	all directions—then helps Abraham down onto a rock.
16	
17	Abraham
18	(once seated; testing)
19	How far have we come?
20	
21	Isaac
22	(looking up at the sun)
23	About three hours since we left the servants.
24	
25	Abraham
26	And before that?
27	
28	Isaac
29	(calculating)
30	About three-and-a-half days.

32	Abraham
33	(pleased)
34	Good. You're remembering your lessons.
35	(removing a stone from his belt)

1	Tell me, what sort of stone is this?
2	
3	Isaac
4	Flint.
5	
6	Abraham
7	(removing another)
8	And this?
9	
10	Isaac
11	Uh, pyrite.
12	
13	Abraham
14	Good. Well done.
15	(holding up the fire holder)
16	And, should the fire go out—?
17	
18	Isaac
19	I would gather dried moss and kindling, and strike one stone against
20	the other to create a spark.
21	
22	Abraham
23	(after waiting expectantly for a few seconds)
24	And what have you left out? Quickly—quickly now.
25	
26	Isaac
27	(struggling to remember)
28	Uh, uh—
29	
30	Abraham
31	Isaac—
32	
33	Isaac
34	Oh! to have the larger pieces of wood ready to add to the kindling.

1	Abraham
2	(nodding)
3	One does not risk the beginnings by failing to prepare for what
4	follows.
5	
6	Isaac
7	Yes, father.
8	
9	Abraham
10	Which would include picking up what has already been scattered.
11	
12	Isaac doesn't catch the reference right away, but then notices the
13	sticks of wood lying about haphazardly.
14	
15	Isaac
16	(beginning to gather the wood)
17	Oh, right.
18	
19	Abraham leans back and takes a drink from his water bag, while
20	Isaac collects the sticks of wood and ties them together with the
21	twine. After a moment, Isaac speaks.
22	
23	Isaac
24	Father?
25	
26	Abraham
27	(distractedly)
28	Yes.
29	
30	Isaac
31	(hesitantly)
32	Why is it you test me—but no one ever tests you? Have you become
33	too old for such things?
34

1	Abraham
2	(after a moment's thought; with a sigh)
3	Old men are tested in ways far different than children.
4	
5	Isaac
6	(quickly reminding; proudly)
7	I am fifteen years, Father.
8	
9	Abraham
10	(with warm humor)
11	My mistake. Old men are tested in ways far different than young men.
12	(beat)
13	As one ages, life becomes more—complicated. The young learn how to
14	create fire; the old must know how to control it. The young are filled
15	to overflowing with life; the old must learn how to make the most of
16	the little they have left. The young may be tested on their knowledge
17	of the sun and stars, on how to prepare a meal—
18	(wearily)
19	—the old are tested down to their bones, to their very soul.
20	
21	Isaac
22	It sounds as if the young have the better end of the bargain.
23	
24	Abraham
25	(nodding his head; smiling)
26	Oh, indeed.
27	
28	Isaac
29	(being silly for effect)
30	I think I would prefer <u>not</u> to grow old, thank you.
31	
32	Abraham
33	(instantly, unexpectedly serious; after a moment; looking away)
34	We have no say in the number of our years.
35	(pause)

1	The measure of a man is not in the number of his years, but in what
2	he does with the ones given him.
3	
4	Isaac
5	Given?
6	
7	Abraham
8	They're all in God's hand. From time to time He tests us—as I test
9	you. But there is a difference. You are tested to expand and retain
10	knowledge. Practical, earth-bound reasons.
11	
12	Isaac
13	But God?
14	
15	Abraham
16	(with a heavy sigh)
17	Ah, God's reasons. That is another thing altogether.
18	(pause)
19	We cannot know. His reasons are His own—and He does not always
20	share them.
21	
22	Isaac
23	(after a moment's thought;
24	haltingly, working through thoughts beyond his years)
25	If I didn't know the end—the reason—I believe I might resent the
26	testing. It's hard; sometimes I struggle. If I didn't know why, I would
27	choose something more profitable—more enjoyable.
28	
29	Abraham
30	Perhaps.
31	(with intensity)
32	But that, precisely, is what God tests: Will we continue in His way,
33	even when the end—the reason—is unknown. And unknowable.
34	(pause)
35	God calls it "faith." Man calls it "obedience."
36	

1	Isaac
2	There's a difference?
3	
4	Abraham
5	A man's faith is <u>demonstrated</u> in his obedience.
6	(becoming more troubled)
7	That is what God tests: our faith. Our obedience—to Him.
8	
9	Isaac
10	And what if we fail?
11	
12	Abraham
13	God is just, but He does not compromise. There is a price to pay when
14	we fail Him.
15	(deeply troubled)
16	And there may be a price to pay even when we do <u>not</u> fail.
17	
18	Isaac
19	(seeing that Abraham is moved by something he (Isaac) does not understand)
20	Father?
21	
22	Abraham
23	My son, in time you may forget what you know about the sun and
24	stars, how to prepare a meal, or strike a fire from stones. These are
25	valuable, but earth-bound.
26	(pause; looking deeply into the eyes of his son)
27	But one thing you must never forget. We have a God. You may not
28	always know the end—the reason—but you must obey Him. Without
29	that, nothing else matters.
30	(pause; looking away)
31	Without that, there <u>is</u> nothing else.
32	
33	Isaac is silent, but slowly nods his head. He understands.
34	
35	
36	

1	Abraham
2	(struggling to get up)
3	Now we must continue. The Lord has beckoned us to worship Him. He
4	is waiting.
5	
6	Isaac picks up the bundle of wood. Abraham picks up his walking
7	stick and begins moving toward the exit. Isaac pauses, looking at
8	the wood in his arms, and realizes something is missing.
9	
10	Isaac
11	Father?
12	
13	Abraham
14	Yes.
15	
16	Isaac
17	We have brought the fire and the wood, but we've forgotten the lamb
18	for the burnt offering!
19	
20	Abraham
21	(turning to look at his son)
22	No, my son. We've not forgotten. God Himself will provide the lamb.
23	
24	They exit.
25	
26	Stage lights down.
27	House lights up.
28
